As tomorrow is our Veteran's Day holiday, our Wednesday newsletter comes home a day early. As we will not be together tomorrow, we ask that students, while at home, consider that more than 50 U.S. soldiers lost their lives in Afghanistan last month alone and that since our operation in Iraq, more than 4,100 U.S. soldiers have perished. We hope to be starting a service learning initiative soon that will allow our students to write letters of support to our servicemen/women overseas.

Please note that we will have a five day holiday for Thanksgiving, Wed. Nov. 25th - Sun. 29th. This will be an important window for students who need some catch up time on E2020. All students must R.A.C.E their answers. **R.A.C.E** stands for: **Restate, Answer, Cite and Explain**. When students fail to show suitable effort to answer their work, they must submit their second attempts in <u>writing</u> to Mrs. Greenley in order to receive credit. Your assistance in checking for the quality of your child's work is appreciated. Grammar and Spelling ARE important. We find that students often write their school work in the manner of their text-messages to one another. Academic excellence requires that writing conventions are learned and followed.






