No School For 5

Days!

Our Thanksgiving break begins tomorrow. We hope that all of our S.O.D.A families enjoy some quality time together. As we know that many students will use some time these 5 days to do some catching up on E2020, know that Mrs. Greenley (and likely other teachers) will check email to see if requests arise for assistance. For students to be reset in their course guizzes, normally in class they must produce the correct answers, in writing, to their last failed quiz. A teacher goes over these notes before resetting the assessment. Teachers ask that for students to make requests for quizzes to be reset from home, that a parent has supervised this request and has ascertained whether the student has made attempts to learn the material not previously learned. A parent's tel. # at the bottom of the

request works nicely, should a teacher wish to verify parental involvement in what is being studied at home. Again, we ask that Topic Tests are taken at school. Quizzes may be completed at home.

Mr. Yates Addresses Helpful Issues in Letter

Last week your child should have taken home a letter that you were asked to read, sign, and return to your child's advisory teacher, thus ensuring that all of our families were updated on two important topics. If you did not read this, please ask your child to get another copy to bring home. In brief, the two topics were: (1) the new afternoon courses we are offering and (2), some helpful information on how to evaluate your child's progress on the E2020 courses.

To recap, all of our students are in two new courses that each run 40 min. at the end of their day. For the most part they chose their courses, but for many, one of their two courses was chosen for them, as these courses provide academic support to students in need. Ms. Hernandez runs a course using "My Skills Tutor" (a computer based skill-building program) and Mr. Romero teaches math tutoring.

As for E2020, we wish to encourage families to think about these computer-based courses a little differently than you would at a typical school. At the end of the semester, courses that are completed receive credit; in those that are not finished, students continue working on. Should each student work to catch up over their two week Christmas vacation? You bet! However, the good news is that on your child's semester report card, you will see their grade based on what they have done, and if they are not finished with the course, it will show you what remains before credit is received. Enrichment courses operate like they would elsewhere. The courses are completed before the

winter holiday. New Enrichment courses will be assigned in January.

Service Learning/Experiential Education
