We all must remember that this is the very first year for the school and you always face challenges when starting out new. Let's all work together to ensure that everything goes smoothly the remaining 2 months. Please encourage your students to continue working hard to complete all of their classes and be on their best behavior. I will be touching on a few areas that we need to concentrate on for the remainder of the school year.

- **Dress Code** many students are wearing clothes that do not comply;

 - 3. Flip flops being worn
 - 4. Wearing shirts that do not comply with the colors that were designated at the beginning of the year

We will be administering the **New Mexico \$tandards Based Assessment** the week of April 12th. This is a state mandated test that is to be administered to 7th and 8th grade students. - <u>Tuesday, Wednesday and</u> <u>Thursday 9th graders are to</u> <u>report at 12:30pm</u>
- **Friday 9th** grade students will not have school as we dismiss at 12:30pm
